



NATIONAL DESERT STORM WAR MEMORIAL

In 1991, America assembled a coalition of 34 countries to turn back an aggressive attempt by Saddam Hussein to conquer a neighboring country. Through bravery, professionalism and courage, we defeated the fourth largest army in the world with few casualties and liberated Kuwait.

Over half a million American servicemen and women served in Operation Desert Storm/Desert Shield, making it the largest American war of the 20th Century without a memorial in Washington, D.C. Building one would be a fitting tribute to those who served, those who died and the families who supported them.

2015-2016 marks the 25th Anniversary of the war and now is the time to build it. Too often, memorials are delayed too long and many of those who are honored never see them. The **National Desert Storm War Memorial Association (NDSWM)** is dedicated to ensuring that the veterans of Desert Storm will have the opportunity to see this built in their lifetime and bring their children and grandchildren to see it.

THE MEMORIAL

In late 2014, Congress passed a bill authorizing a memorial to be built on or near the National Mall in Washington, D.C. Although the final plans must still be approved by the National Park Service, the proposed memorial would be designed in the shape of a left hook – paying tribute to the bold and innovative strategic gamble that shortened the war and saved many American and allied lives.
